Ah, the approach of the fall season! The sight and sounds of FOOTBALL are in the air! Do I like football? Is the Pope Catholic? Does an elevator go up and down? It goes without saying that I enjoy college football and especially enjoy following a team that will remain unnamed..., but it resides in "Happy Valley."

My love affair with football began when I was a kid. I enjoyed playing in pick-up touch football games. My mother hated it because I usually came home several times a year with broken glasses.

By the time I reached teenage years, I stopped playing organized football because I would have gotten killed. I couldn't see without glasses and only weighed 125 pounds soaking wet.

Since my love for the game didn't go away, I became the equipment manager for our high school team. In this way I could hang out with the players and coaches and learn more about the game that I loved.

St. Paul, in writing of his own physical inadequacies reports that the Lord told him, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My strength is made perfect in weakness." (2 Cor. 12:9)

Finally, if we remain faithful and united to our Lord, we are all guaranteed to be "professionals." There are no "minor league" Christians. And upon retirement, we are "pros" with an eternal "pension" in the Kingdom of God.

Let us begin anew this fall season, working diligently to be "professional" players on God's team! ✝

If I Have Wounded a Soul Today....

If I have caused one's foot to go astray;

If I have walked in my own willful way,

Dear Lord, Forgive!

Forgive the sins I have confessed to thee;

Forgive my secret sins I do not see;

O guide me, love me, and my keeper be;

Dear Lord, Amen.

This beautiful and prayerful song tells us how to love our neighbor as well as God Himself and that we need to ask forgiveness for our sins. As Christians we are to love one another and often we learn what we must do to love yet there are things we must not do to also show our love. In Matthew 9:2 a man with palsy was brought to Jesus, and Jesus seeing the faith of those who brought him, healed the sick man. This is an example of what we do to love our neighbor. The faith of this sick man's companions brought compassion from Jesus to heal.

However, St. Paul explains we must not cause our neighbor to sin due to our behavior. In I Corinthians 8, it is written: "Now concerning food offered to idols; we know all of us possess knowledge. Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. If anyone imagines that he knows something, he does not yet know as he ought to know. But if one loves God, one is known by Him." True blessedness consists not in

knowing, but being known by God, and it is in love that one is known. St. Paul continues that he who "knows" may eat food offered to idols because that person knows idols have no real existence and there is no God but One. Therefore the eating of sacrificed food means nothing. However, Paul continues that not everyone possesses such knowledge and they may eat food believing it is offered to real idols, therefore defiling themselves. Therefore, you who have knowledge eats food sacrificed to idols and your weak neighbor sees you and also partakes but for the wrong understanding, then we are responsible for our neighbors defilement. "Thus sinning against your brethren and wounding their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore if food is a cause of my brother's falling, I will never eat meat, lest I cause my brother to fall: (I Corinthians 8:12-13).

Therefore, if I do something that leads my brother astray or to sin then, I sin against God. If I do not attend Church regularly and my children or neighbor learns to not attend regularly because of my example, then I sin twice. If I attend meetings in places that profess a different god and I am seen by others who misunderstand and it tempts them to believe in

false gods, then I sin. If my behavior in Church is distracting to others such as extremely loud continuous coughing or my children are distracting, then I must remove these distractions until it calms. Some may say why is it proper to leave (temporarily) church for these reasons? If my actions that I control cause a person of weaker faith to be distracted from worshipping God, am I any different than a person who leads a fellow Christian to idol worship? Either way I have caused someone to be led astray. Those who have a strong faith know to remove themselves and others so the weak may worship, until all is calm.

If my dress is too revealing or distracting that I lead a neighbor to lust or be distracted, do I not also sin against Christ. If I teach and my neighbor misunderstands and it leads him astray and I do not correct the misunderstanding, then I am guilty of a greater sin. Evil comes at us from any direction, especially when we least expect it. Fight evil with love. Do not wound, Do not lead others astray, Do not follow your willful ways, Confess your sins and yet we pray that God Forgives.

Did You Know.....?

That there are guidelines to be followed by Orthodox Christians for the Sacraments (Mysteries) of Baptism and Chrismation. The priest should be notified immediately upon the birth of a child so that he may visit the mother and child and say the prayers for the birth and naming of a child. The father of the child should also be present.

Baptisms/Chrismations are allowed at any time during the Church Year, even during fasting periods. However, if a baptism should be held during a fasting period, consideration must be given to the types of food served at the meal following the service, especially if it falls during the Great Lent (Fast).

Before setting the date for the baptism or choosing the Godparent (s) for the child, the couple must meet with the priest and discuss any problems that might arise. People converting to the Orthodox Faith from another Christian faith are received into the Church through the Sacrament

of Holy Chrismation if they have been baptized with water and in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, following a proper instruction period in the Faith. Otherwise they are baptized and chrismated. They also need an Orthodox sponsor when converting.

In addition to the baptismal cross, a white garment, a large white towel and a small bottle of extra virgin olive oil must be provided by the family or Godparent (s). The family must inform the pastor of the church if they would like any additional Orthodox clergy to participate (especially if it is the assistant pastor). The pastor will then extend the invitation to him/them to assist with the sacrament.

With the Sacraments of Baptism/Chrismation, the child or adult is given the Holy Eucharist (Communion), unless it is arranged with the pastor to be given at the next Divine Liturgy. May God grant those who become Orthodox Christians **MANY YEARS!** ✝




Kids Crossword Puzzle Answers

Kids Q & A


Q. What is a Bible?




